I've spent most of my time since the end of the exam analyzing the data from Exam I. The average was low, 95.5/175, or 55%. You are undoubtedly concerned about this, and trust me, I am as well. I have dissected each exam question, and with the exception of the side chain table issue I contacted you about yesterday, the questions are ok. It's pretty obvious that most students don't do the required readings, but I'm not here to scold you, I'm here to make sure this doesn't happen again.

In thinking about how to move forward, it would be a great help if I knew what the issues were on your end. With that in mind, I have created a 3-question survey for you which should take no longer than 5 minutes of your time at the most. I could have done this in LON-CAPA, but I am doing it in an external service called SurveyMonkey for an extremely important reason:
